

Palmetto

Students in the Palmetto Class are continuing to build on their writing skills with our weekly Writers' Workshops. Grade-level groups are practicing with a variety of exercises and are becoming more comfortable with the craft of writing, both in creative ways and to communicate information about their own learning. We are continuing our work with the Second Great Lesson, the Coming of Life, by introducing one period at a time from our Timeline of Life.

We have spent a little more time these past few weeks in the Carboniferous Period (just imagine giant insects buzzing around in swampy forests of giant ferns!) and will wrap up the Paleozoic Era next week with our review of the Permian Period. With every period, we have seen some species become extinct if they are unable to adapt to changing conditions, a theme that will continue throughout our study.

We have also been spending time considering the Fundamental Needs of Humans, another of the big ideas around which the Montessori elementary curriculum is organized. Several of our students have started to notice connections between their own independent research interests and this idea of fundamental needs, and they are planning with peers about ways we may be able to incorporate these larger themes into their own work.

Just this week the students decided to embark on yet another project, the opportunity to determine who (what) will be our next class pet. As you know, our well-loved Syrian hamster Coconut passed away of natural causes earlier in the year, and this week the children proposed a series of inquiries to help choose a new pet. Rather than a simple vote, the students have organized themselves into research teams to learn about the pros and cons of each animal that has been proposed as a class pet. (To their credit, they all immediately rejected Mr. Michael's suggestion of a King Cobra!) We are gathering books and other information sources now and are looking forward to learning about the characteristics that will make a good class pet.

Magnolia

Our class has been doing the TimeLine of Life. There are three eras. They are Paleozoic, Mesozoic, and Cenozoic. This month we studied the Paleozoic. and finished it. We read books about each period and looked at fossils. The second graders have done body functions of birds and mammals. We have been looking into the microscope to see slides of bone cells, frog blood, human blood cells, leaf stomas, human squamous epithelium, and insect legs. The second and third graders did parts of plant cells and animal cells. The first graders learned about parts of a plant and are studying the different triangles and quadrilaterals in geometry. We have two groups of third grade geometry. One of our groups has been measuring angles of triangles. The other group is learning about the parts of a circle and the relationship of a circle to a straight line or another circle. The third graders got geometric multiplication this month. Second graders are using the small and large bead frames. The first graders are working on Golden Beads and stamp games. We look forward to sharing with you next time!
