#### **Brief Reminders:**

## Primary 3

#### **Happy Autumn from Primary 3!**

September flew by, literally! With Helene in the last few days of the month, and the resounding effects have been a sense of inquiry and resilience in the children, as they spoke with empathy and wonder, helped clean up the campus, and wished thoughts of hope and healing to their families and friends.

The children have embraced their daily routines and weekly rhythms. I've loved 'coming home' to our sweet space each morning, observing the children engrossed in their unique and meaningful works- one of which is coffee-grinding! One of my favorite observations to make is of the first work a child gravitates toward each morning. While a few of the first year students might spend more time in observation themselves, I know that they, too, are deeply engrossed in learning through the powers of their *absorbent mind*. It's encouraging to see the older children work with the younger. One example of this is older children practicing reading the labels (a language work for reading, moving, and labeling the objects in our Children's House) then allowing the younger child to move their bodies and grow more acquainted with our space as they place the labels (e.g. 'beads', 'flag', 'plant').

Outside, we are still watching our squash seedling, but we think the birds and squirrels have helped themselves to the sprouts. Inside, we've been keeping the windows open to enjoy the fresh air and so the children can enjoy watching the ongoing road work, so I've added a construction vehicle card work on the shelf to bridge the gap between the world outside and the cozy calm of the classroom.

Our MSC calendar is full, and I am grateful for the many opportunities to connect with parents and families outside of class. We are looking forward to celebrating Rosh Hashanah in class with Allison Goldstein (Isaac's mom) and focusing on forgiveness, practicing generosity, and accepting renewal.

## Magnolia

The Magnolians spent September honing their reading, language, and math skills. The first graders are making strides learning the phonics patterns of short vowels and blends along with puzzle words in their reading the language. The third graders have enjoyed a literature study of *Bunnicula* by Deborah and James Howe. As a class, we've thoroughly enjoyed reading *The Trumpet of the Swan* by E. B. White. Students are discussing literary elements while bonding with the story of Louis, the talented and graceful swan without a voice.

Our transition to the next part of our Cosmic Curriculum, The Coming of Life, has begun. Now that the Universe and the Earth have been made, students will begin to explore, at their own pace, the wonderfully interesting evolution of life on our planet.

We have had many geography lessons about the Earth and have delved into the composition of the Earth from the core to the mantle. We have also looked at the layers of the atmosphere. The Autumnal Equinox was celebrated with lessons on how the tilt of the Earth causes the seasons and the changes in temperature in the geographical zones of the Earth. In Biology, the first graders are learning the parts of fish and amphibians. The second graders are extending themselves to the body functions of fish and amphibians while the third graders are exploring a matrix of the body functions of all the vertebrates. We have touched on parts of plants, trees, and flowers in Botany.

The Magnolians have embarked on a few field trips this month. The third graders of both classes went to the Challenger Center where they experienced flight simulation, a planetarium documentary, and a lesson on some of NASA's most recent developments. The Lower Elementary classes both took a visit to the South Carolina State Museum. Students were able to enjoy a planetarium documentary discussing the Big Bang Theory and the creation of the Universe. They also visited various exhibits in smaller groups.

The Magnolia Room flag (pictured below) was completed, thanks to the help of our third graders. They combined the personal flags of each member to make the one. Lastly, in the canon, they opted to have a magnolia flower symbolize the unification of our community.

# **Palmetto**

We have been having a busy month in the Palmetto class. Dr. Montessori believed that "going out" into the community is a good way to integrate classroom learning into our daily lives – and we agree! We are off to a good start with our travels around the local community. Our third-year students joined Magnolia thirds recently for a trip to the Challenger Learning Center to gain experience in space science. We followed this up with a whole-class trip to the South Carolina State Museum and Planetarium, where we saw the film *We Are Stars* before taking some time to explore the museum galleries.

We are working together through the steps of developing a research question, using manatees as our shared subject. Our trip to the Richland Library will give us an opportunity to check out books that will be helpful as we learn about the topics that interest us most. Planning and time management skills continue to be a focus for our class. We are introducing the children to a variety of planning tools and strategies to help them get to all the interesting works they would like to learn about during the time we have together.

We look forward to hosting our families for Watch Me Work on two evenings. The children will show their families around the classroom and demonstrate some of the lessons they have been working on. Later in the week, we will be welcoming everyone for Parent-Teacher conferences. We enjoy sharing information about your child's progress and look forward to seeing you soon.


