Primary 2

Happy Fall, everyone. I hope you all are enjoying the Fall weather like we are. There are many great things we will be introducing to the children this month: the Botany Cabinet, seeds, and the Pumpkin Life cycle, to name a few. We will also start our study of Europe. The children love the flag- and map- making lessons of North America. We think they will enjoy learning about the continent of Europe and all the great places within.

The bright yellow blooms we observed last month have changed, and we now have two green pie pumpkins growing in our garden. They are the perfect size for picking but have not changed colors yet. We will be picking them this week before the weather destroys them. We will add one of them to our indoor observation tray and dissect the other. The sweet potatoes appear to be thriving.

There are many different things going on this month. Show and Tell is every Friday. Your child's item remains inside his or her bag until it is time for sharing, which is the only time it is allowed to be out. On Monday, November 11, we will learn about Veterans Day. Magnolia

It is nice to have a chance to share with you once again all of the wonderful things that we have been doing over the past month.

Since we last shared, we have finished our Clock of Eons lessons, arriving at the Phanerozoic Eon (the one in which we're currently living!). We will unfold the Phanerozoic Eon and look closely at the different Geological Eras and Periods of time. We'll be more than ready to share with you our amazing discoveries. As geologists and geographers, we have finished studying the Composition of the Earth. We have studied all the way from the inner core to the exosphere, while also studying parts and types of mountains and volcanoes. To finish our studies of our planet, we covered the Rock Cycle, learning about Igneous, Sedimentary, and Metamorphic rocks and how they are formed.

In other areas of the classroom, students have continued studying the classifications of vertebrates, identifying their external parts and bodily functions. All levels are advancing in geometry. Third Graders are building their skills and proficiency in measuring angles of polygons using protractors. Second Graders are covering the Relationships Between Straight Lines and transitioning into identifying types of angles, while our First Graders are continuing to explore the etymology and characteristics of geometric shapes.

Each level of the Magnolia Room has completed a literature study. Third Graders enjoyed the first book of the *Bunnicula* series by Deborah and James Howe, *Bunnicula*, while Second Graders read either *A Mouse Called Wolf*, by Dick King-Smith, or *Amelia Bedelia Helps Out*, by Peggy Parish. First Graders enjoyed reading the short story *The Little Red Hen*, by Paul Galdone. Each group worked on literary elements such as setting, characters, conflict, resolution, story sequencing, and resolutions. We will continue with grade level literature study and will continue to share our experiences.

Our outside of the classroom adventures have taken us to the South Carolina State Museum, where we enjoyed a wonderful planetarium experience that made connections to the scientific theories we studied in our *First Great Lesson: The Creation of the Universe*. We have also visited the Richland County Public Library, where we were treated to a puppet show and allowed to explore and obtain books that piqued our curiosity.

All in all, Magnolians have settled into the school year and are making strides in their everyday learning. We can not wait to share with you all of the discoveries and experiences we will make over the next month. Until then, be well!

Palmetto

Palmetto class has been working through the research process with animal research projects. We enjoyed a day at the Richland County Public Library, where we were able to check out books related to our animal research topics. Some students have already completed their projects and are sharing them during our group meetings in the morning.

We recently began our study with the *Timeline of Life*, a beautiful material that encompasses much of Maria Montessori's Second Great Lesson- *The Coming of Life*. Students are being introduced to each period of time and finding ways to interact with the timeline in their own, unique ways.

Students have also been working diligently on their math fact practice. Each Friday, students are completing a timed fact quiz on either addition, multiplication, or subtraction to help build their mathematical fluency. We've had all students increase their fluency every week.

We recently received a wonderful donation of a keyboard, and students have thoroughly enjoyed their time outside practicing reading notes and playing familiar tunes. We are excited to see how their piano skills will progress in the next few months!
