We recently hosted our annual Valentine's Day Party, including the whole Primary and Elementary classes. We were pleased to see some MSC alumni volunteering to help out!

Since last month was February and Black History Month, we have completed recent research on different people from black history, such as: Ruby Bridges, Byron Lewis, Malcolm X, and many more... In March, we will be celebrating Women's History Month with research on Amelia Earhart, Amanda Gordon, Cleopatra, Helen Keller, and others.

Our monthly community lunch for this month was Chicken Alfredo, salad made from our plant system, and banana muffins, which were all made by the class.

Magnolia

We are happy to have a full class of healthy children again! The Magnolia Room was rather sickly month. We had many children out with the flu, viruses, and pneumonia. One day, only seven children were in attendance!

We began the Third Great Lesson, *the Coming of Humans* this month. We have looked at the different hominids from Ardipithecus through Homo Habilis and Homo Erectus to Homo Sapiens. Children can explore our card works and timelines. We have skull models of many of the hominids for the children to examine.

The Magnolians have started to explore economic geography and the interdependencies of humans in our society. We have looked at the many different people it takes to produce our bread, meat, and clothes.

One of our parents, Elliot Hong, gave a presentation on the Chinese Spring Festival and their family's trip to China last summer. It was a wonderful connection for our Lower Elementary community to share.

Last but not least, we have completed our read aloud of *The Wizard of Oz* by, L. Frank Baum. Both children and teachers alike were locked into the journey of Dorothy Gale and her companions. The children worked on many literature elements such as: identifying characters, identifying the main problem vs. secondary problem in the plot, summarizing characters and chapters, and identifying solutions.

We look forward to having a healthy March and sharing our growth with you.

The students in the Palmetto Class have started a whole-class book study with a read-aloud of *Because of Winn-Dixie*, by Kate DiCamillo. While some of us have read or heard the story before, we are taking the book slowly by reading one chapter per day then writing about a different element of the book. So far, we have explored ideas of plot, setting, and character development. We are collecting our daily essays for inclusion in our individual writing portfolios at the end of the year. Following our experience with this book study together, we will look forward to individual grade-level book clubs later in the Spring.

Thank you to everyone who attended the annual school auction and especially to everyone who was interested in our class auction project! We gained some good experience in working with wood and with decorating and finishing our planter box.

As part of our work with the Fundamental Needs of Humans, we have started a study of the history of bread. On Tuesday, we enjoyed a traditional Mardi Gras treat of pancakes, a simple type of flatbread that has been made by people for thousands of years. As we continue with our study, we will practice making other kinds of bread to enjoy together.

As we approach the official beginning of Spring, we are starting our study of plant life. While we have cared for and studied plants throughout the school year, we are looking forward to more detailed work on the various plant parts and their functions, the fundamental needs of plants, and some of the ways that people depend on plants in our daily lives.

Spanish News

And... ACTION! Elementary Spanish classes in February were focused on narrative. Lower Elementary classes are reading stories while analyzing and manipulating noun phrases. After learning to Cha Cha on our last Spanish field trip of the year, Upper Elementary classes have begun filming scenes from their telenovela, El Atraco (The Heist), and drafting paragraphs using adjective/noun agreement, conjugated verbs, question words, prepositions, and new vocabulary. Primary Spanish classes are learning their números hasta 100 and have learned three verses to Los Pollitos Dicen Pio Pio Pio in preparation for Grandparents and Special Friends Day. 5k classes have learned the names of shapes and body parts. See if you can keep up with your child in a round of Muévete, the song and dance game played during Spanish class to teach names of body parts, directives, and verbs!
